Reminder: If you need to renew your ARRL membership, you can do so through the club and the club will receive a commission from ARRL. I will have the forms at our next meeting.



The standard "NATO" phonetic alphabet (actually the International Radio-Telephony Spelling Alphabet) is: Alfa, Bravo, Charlie, Delta, Echo, Foxtrot, Golf, Hotel, India, Juliett, Kilo, Lima, Mike, November, Oscar, Papa, Quebec, Romeo, Sierra, Tango, Uniform, Victor, Whiskey, X-ray, Yankee, Zulu.

What is the difference between NATO and phonetic alphabet? Phonetic alphabets are used to indicate, through symbols or codes, what a speech sound or letter sounds like. The NATO Phonetic Alphabet is instead a spelling alphabet (also known as telephone alphabet, radio alphabet, wordspelling alphabet, or voice procedure alphabet).

What does Tango Mike mean? Answer: It means "thank you," or specifically, "thanks much." In 1955, many military organizations, including NATO and the U.S. military, adopted a phonetic alphabet to aid in correctly transmitting messages.

What does Lima Charlie mean? "Loud and Clear "Lima Charlie" is representative of the letters "L" and "C" in the NATO alphabet, which when used together in military parlance stands for "Loud and Clear".

"Bravo Zulu" is a Naval signal, conveyed by flag-hoist or voice radio, meaning "well done;" it has also passed into the spoken and written vocabulary. There are some myths and legends attached to this signal.

According to the Navy, the popular term comes from the Allied Naval Signal Book created by NATO as a system of signals displayed by either a flag hoist or voice radio to communicate and relay messages back and forth between various naval vessels.

This will help them with better tracking and understanding of our Skywarn and other emergency services we as a club deliver. An active RACES membership is required because of the state background check required for membership addresses all the security restrictions in the business areas of the Sheriff's Department. But even if you are not in RACES, we still need and want your help with all the other activities that are involved.

SECRETARY REPORT

Minutes Regular meeting 18 March 2023

President Mark Hetherington called the meeting to order at 0906. Jessie Brown did the invocation and led the pledges.

President's Report: Mark mentioned the upcoming events for the club.

- October 7th Autumn in Bonham Bicycle Event we will be assisting in this event.
 Communications for the Rest Stops, Support & Gear (SAG) vehicles that pick riders and bicycles up and live stream video back to the Start/Finish area from a point.
- Severe weather practice drill turned into a live event March 2. Sharon and Bob will give report later in the meeting.
- Technician class going well, with testing planned for March 30 at 1900 at Bois d'Arc Creek Cowboy Church. WCARS VE's are needed to help with this.

Vice President's Report: James reported that the bands are wide open, with many contacts made. General class has had one test and gain General license – Rick Huntoon.

Secretary Report: Sarah read the minutes from February 18 meeting, asked for a motion to approve if there were no changes. Motion made, seconded and minutes were approved.

Sharon gave a report of the events of March 2, 2023 during the activation of Skywarn and Emergency Management. Sharon was at the Fannin County Sheriff's Office when they lost power. People were manning their posts. Alicia Whipple for monetary concerns if necessary, Jennifer managing logistics, Judge Newt and Tammy Biggar for PSA type things, Sharon for communications. Sharon became NET control when Mark lost power and his battery was in his car. Fuzzy went to Leonard where there was thought to be a structure fire. A report of the repeater being out of power sent Dr. Mike to the Ivanhoe tower, which was operational. Jeff P went to Ravenna, and other operators went to areas as needed. Our teamwork was shown well – stayed on the net because of communication failure for the County. She wished she had her own set for the familiarity. Bob Yakel tells more of the tale. Power was lost at the Bailey tower, but our repeater did not go down.
